Greetings!

It's not long now. In just a few short weeks Donald J. Trump will become the 45th President of the United States. Many Americans are apprehensive or frightened at the incoming regime,



some may be hopeful and excited, but the vast majority are waiting anxiously to see what policies emerge from an administration whose campaign lacked any coherent policy. I had problems with much of President Obama's agenda; he got passes from the Left on many issues that would have drawn fire if they came from the Right, but he's certainly no Donald Trump. I have much more severe concerns with Mr. Trump, even more with a President Trump, but our country faces serious problems and now many of these may be exacerbated by this deeply flawed man child. The New Boss isn't the same as the Old Boss, but in a free country the fundamental obligations of citizens to pay attention and be involved have only increased.

Personally, I think political participation is not just a benefit of a free society but the obligation of all citizens. Businesses as a group may tend to shy away from the potential divisiveness of politics, but as a small business owner my business is my life and it's hard to compartmentalize my values. My business has been built on personal principles like integrity, service, transparency, accountability, rationality, and fairness. I believe in paying a good living wage to the individuals who make us an exceptional company, and that any profit should be fair compensation for value rendered and not spoils from plundering the unwary or defenseless. I personally believe companies should be good neighbors; not just "doing no harm" but actively working to make things better in the communities they serve, and I think our community goes beyond Sellwood to Portland, to Oregon, to America, and to the World.

The dignity and grace of President Obama was a refreshing change from the simplistic bumbling of his predecessor, but I didn't give his administration a pass just because he was a nice guy who ran as a progressive Democrat ... he has governed as a Centrist Republican (at best) and a Corporate Authoritarian (at worst). As just a few examples I've called out his bad policy on whistleblowers, the death of habeas corpus, his rollover on single-payer health care, his failure to prosecute criminal banking cartels or the greed on Wall Street, his expansion of drone warfare and extra-judicial killings, and his contraction of civil liberties. Obama got a pass from the sleeping Left that allowed actions which would have been resisted if they had come from a more obvious corporatist.

Donald Trump was an unknown; pretending to be the populist so desperately sought by the American people. He will almost certainly not act as a populist but as the pathological greedy automaton he is. Trump gave few lucid policy positions (good or bad) during the campaign but of the few he did toss out many have already been altered or forgotten. He doesn't yet have a presidential record but the people he's tapped for cabinet positions and the policies they've suggested have been startlingly unqualified and biased. When Trump surrogates are reduced to defending his policies by saying he didn't really mean them, or the ones he did mean can't be implemented because they're illegal or impossible, policy shouldn't be hard to critique once he actually takes office. And I, for one, plan to speak out against bad policy no matter the source.

When politics is reduced to mud-slinging, deception and lies, it's up to us as citizens to look beyond the media fluff, ferret out the facts and be willing to work to fight to preserve the dwindling flame of democracy. Most people assume I'm a Democrat but I'm not, nor am I a Republican. When I do talk about politics I try to avoid the individual personalities or party hyperbole and address the underlying issues or policies. Look again at the list of personal values above... is it "partisan" in any way? When we build our lives, our businesses, our political systems; is there any point on the list that "works" for one party and not the other? I don't think so. What I care about most is basic fairness and sustainability; including healthcare, education, taxes, military spending, militarization of the police, the environment, and the support of the middle class and the poor. Donald Trump's America promises to be a big change from Obama's America and probably the America envisioned by our Founders. But I won't waste time sniping at his personal or stylistic failings; I'll be arguing with his content. And that's not a change from the way I viewed the vast achievements and vast shortfalls of Obama's turn at the helm. I'm just not sure I'll be able to handle "presidential tweets" from a man who I have ZERO respect for and who could in whimsical ego bursts destroy so much.

Hey, what's that chalk mark on my tire?

It's a tiny detail, but it's critical to your safety



Even if you're "not a car person" you still know wheels must stay attached to a vehicle for safe and proper function. You probably also know they're secured with fasteners commonly called "lug nuts", but did you know there are right and wrong ways to install these seemingly-simple nuts? Too tight can be just as bad as too loose, and tightening them carelessly can lead to wheel damage or stud or nut failure. Here's a look at how the little detail of proper nut tightening matters, what happens if it's ignored, and how the unique procedures we've established ensure this vital detail is taken care of reliably for every client...

The nuts and bolts of nuts and bolts


Wheels are mount with (often) 5 threaded bolts called "studs" or "lugs", each with its own

specially designed lug nut. Lug nuts perform much as any other nut, but they must be tightened sequentially and tightened to a very specific tension to work reliably. Carelessly blasting them into place with air tools can be problematic! The wheel lugs, not matter how many, must be installed and gradually and sequentially tightened up to the point the final "tightness" or torque is applied with a torque wrench to the vehicle manufacture's exact specification... too tight can be just as bad as too loose.



"Torque" is the amount of twisting force used to tighten a nut. It's commonly measured in foot-pounds (ft-lbs), and the proper torque for lug nuts varies from as low as 60 ft-lbs to over 120 ft-lbs. Whether the wheels are cast, stamped, machined; made from aluminum. magnesium or steel, the

diameter and metallurgy of the wheel stud itself, vehicle weight, the number of wheel nuts (4, 5, 6 even 8 or even more for larger vehicles), and the design of the lug nut itself all play a part in determining the ideal torque specification for every vehicle.





damage. Although metal seems rigid it's actually slightly springy and pliable, so when a nut is tightened the bolt actually stretches. This is taken into account in the design of the nut and bolt, and in a properly tightened nut the slight pressure of the bolt trying to return to its normal shape actually helps hold the nut securely in place. It may be tempting to tighten a nut as hard as possible but over-tightening can be almost as bad as under-tightening. Lug nuts that are over

tightened can stretch the bolt past its elastic limit so it can't spring back to normal shape, leaving the nut without the pressure it needs to work correctly.

What can possibly go wrong?

Failure to observe proper torque specifications or procedures can cause problems, none of which are pleasant or inexpensive.


- 1) The obvious worst possibility is that when wheel lug nuts are too loose they can back off and can cause the wheel to separate from the vehicle... very bad!
- 2) Over-tightened wheel lug nuts can damage the wheel, and actually stretch the wheel studs, making them weak and subject to failure. If one stud fails as a result of over-torque the others possibly experienced similar treatment and may be damaged as well. One failed lug will not cause the wheel to come off, but now you have one broken wheel stud with the others taking up a load higher than they were designed for. Over-tightened lug nuts or failure to use gradual sequential tensioning can also damage the wheel and cause warped brake rotors. All of these can lead to an unneeded car repair bill; bad!
- 3) Lug nuts that are too tight can be really hard to remove without air tools. If you have a flat and the last person to install the wheels blasted them on with air tools, good luck getting the lug nuts off with the cheesy lug wrench supplied in the vehicle's spare tire kit; not good!

How do we prevent these problems?

Knowing the proper nut torque is one thing, but achieving it is another and achieving it consistently on every vehicle we service is something else again. We've done it by setting a rigorous procedure that honors the fine details necessary for proper installation, and then building in layers of safety protocols and failsafes so our Technicians always know the procedure has been followed. We know every wheel we remove is reinstalled and hand-torqued to the vehicle manufacturer's specification.

Our torqueing procedure

Each nut must be tightened in the proper order in steps to get close to but less than the proper torque, and then finished with a torque wrench (still in the proper order) to achieve the precise final tension. It's important that this final step of tensioning is applied with a torque wrench and not just checked with a torque wrench! If that sounds like a small detail, it's not. A lug nut blasted into place by a brute with an air gun on its highest setting will definitely be way over the designated torque, but when "checked with a torque wrench" it will appear to be fine.



The failsafes

Prior to torqueing- It's impossible to tell visually if a nut in its final position is properly torqued, so we never get it close enough to have any doubt. When our Technicians are working with wheels they often use a lug nut to hold the wheel in place, but they'll only put it on a few threads (until the final steps) so it's visually obvious that the nut has not been tightened OR torqued.

After torqueing- After ALL the nuts on a single wheel have

been torqued to the correct spec and in the correct pattern, we make a small chalk mark next to the air stem of the tire to indicate that the lug nuts on that wheel are torqued and safe. This process is performed one wheel at a time. This is a clear indicator to the Technician working on the vehicle that those wheel lug nuts are torqued... there's no "wait, did I do that one?" type of doubt involved. It also serves as point of confirmation in our Post Service checkout, where the staff knows to look for chalk marks on every tire that's been removed and reinstalled for service.

One other small detail about that chalk mark... we change chalk colors each year so there is no confusion if a mark is new or old. In 2017 we will be using RED chalk to mark your tires. So now when you see that little RED mark on your tires after service you know why it's there and you can feel good about all the thinking that goes into just that one little mark.

Our final failsafe is possibly our best... the personal integrity and responsibility of our Technicians. The issue of wheel torque is so important it's one of the few technical issues in our Policy Manual for new Technicians. It states that "Every wheel will be torqued to vehicle specifications and the inside wall of the tire and outside near stem will be marked with a tire crayon. This policy is for all employees and will be followed without exception", and that violating that standard is grounds for termination. All our people know how seriously we take this as a company, so they know to take it seriously themselves.



What's been the result?

There are lots of serious problems that can arise from your vehicle, but things that make it catch fire, make its wheels fall off, or make it lose brake hydraulics are things we take particularly seriously. In the first 18 years of operation we had two episodes of a loose wheel causing problems (fortunately none caused accidents) but two is too many. Anytime we have a problem from operations we learn and formulate a response or change to policy to prevent a reoccurrence and wheel torque was no exception. We are serious about proper wheel lug nut etiquette and we had zero defect for over 12 years. As far as we know it's a level of detail and commitment that no other shops approach, but it's typical of the fanatic commitment we have our clients' safety and driving confidence.



C'mon, you remember... that time back in the 1930's when industrialists and bankers conspired to create a 500,000-member army of WWI vets to overthrow FDR, but then were outed by their hand-picked general before the coup could go through? And remember when the House UnAmerican Activities Committee held hearings, but no one was held responsible? Still don't remember? Well, you weren't just asleep in class. "The Business Plot" is one of the most direct threats our democracy has ever faced, but it's also one of the least-known events in our history. As an administration of billionaires, generals, propagandists, paranoiacs, xenophobes, and bigots prepares to take office, now

may be the ideal time to look back at

Mark Twain reputedly said "History doesn't repeat itself, but it rhymes". Depression-era America was a very different place from today's America, but they faced the same choice between authoritarian fascism and socialized democracy we do today. No one yet understood the evil Hitler represented so business leaders watched with interest as he rebuilt Germany from the ashes of WWI. People around the world were looking to fascists like Hitler and Mussolini for strong, simple solutions to deep-rooted and complex problems. Here at home those same business leaders were furious about the "traitor to his class" FDR and his notion of a social safety net to protect all Americans, an idea diametrically opposed to fascism. If you think those 1-percenters-of-their-day were content to let politics play out and see where things settled, you're wrong. They went much further than opposing FDR at the next election or even obstructing his plans throughout his administration. According to General Smedley Darlington Butler, they planned a coup.

The Business Plot To Overthrow Roosevelt

In the summer of 1933, shortly after Roosevelt's "First 100 Days," America's richest businessmen were in a panic. It was clear that Roosevelt intended to conduct a massive redistribution of wealth from the rich to the poor. Roosevelt had to be stopped at all costs.

The answer was a military coup. It was to be secretly financed and organized by leading officers of the Morgan and Du Pont empires. This included some of America's richest and most famous names of the time:

Irenee Du Pont - Right-wing chemical industrialist and founder of the American Liberty League, the organization assigned to execute the plot.

Grayson Murphy - Director of Goodyear, Bethlehem Steel and a group of J.P. Morgan banks.

William Doyle - Former state commander of the American Legion and a central plotter of the coup. John Davis - Former Democratic presidential candidate and a senior attorney for J.P. Morgan.

Al Smith - Roosevelt's bitter political foe from New York. Smith was a former governor of New York and a radioactor of the American

York and a codirector of the American Liberty League.

John J. Raskob - A high-ranking Du Pont officer and a former chairman of the Democratic Party. In later decades, Raskob would become a "Knight of Malta," a Roman Catholic Religious Order with a high percentage of CIA spies, including CIA Directors William Casey, William Colby and John McCone.

Robert Clark - One of Wall Street's richest bankers and stockbrokers.

Gerald MacGuire - Bond salesman for Clark, and a former commander of

the Connecticut American Legion. MacGuire was the key recruiter to General Butler.

The plotters attempted to recruit General Smedley Butler to lead the coup. They selected him because he was a war hero who was popular with the troops. The plotters felt his good reputation was important to

make the troops feel confident that they were doing the right thing overthrowing a democratically elected president. However, this was a mistake: Butler was popular with the troops because he identified with them. That is, he was a man of the people, not the elite. When the plotters approached General Butler with their proposal to lead the coup, he pretended to go along with the plan at first, secretly deciding to betray it to Congress at the right moment.

What the businessmen proposed was dramatic: they wanted General Butler to deliver an ultimatum to Roosevelt. Roosevelt would pretend to become sick and incapacitated from his polio, and allow a newly created cabinet officer, a "Secretary of General Affairs," to run things in his stead. The secretary, of course, would be carrying out the orders

of Wall Street. If Roosevelt refused, then General Butler would force him out with an army of 500,000 war veterans from the American Legion. But MacGuire assured Butler the cover story would work:

"You know the American people will swallow that. We have got the newspapers. We will start a campaign that the President's health is failing. Everyone can tell that by looking at him, and the dumb American people will fall for it in a second..."

The businessmen also promised that money was no object: Clark told Butler that he would spend half his

\$60 million fortune to save the other half.

And what type of government would replace Roosevelt's New Deal? MacGuire was perfectly candid to Paul French, a reporter friend of General Butler's:

"We need a fascist government in this country... to save the nation from the communists who want to tear it down and wreck all that we have built in America. The only men who have the patriotism to do it are the soldiers, and Smedley Butler is the ideal leader. He could organize a million men overnight."

Indeed, it turns out that MacGuire travelled to Italy to study Mussolini's fascist state, and came away mightily impressed. He wrote glowing reports back to his boss, Robert Clark, suggesting that they implement the same thing.

If this sounds too fantastic to believe, we should remember that by 1933, the crimes of fascism were still mostly in the future, and its dangers were largely unknown, even to its supporters. But in the early days, many businessmen openly admired Mussolini because he had used a strong hand to deal with labor unions, put out social unrest, and get the economy working again, if only at the point of a gun. Americans today would be appalled to learn of the many famous millionaires back then who initially admired Hitler and Mussolini: Henry Ford, John Rockefeller, John and Allen Dulles (who, besides being millionaires, would later become Eisenhower's Secretary of State and CIA Director, respectively), and, of course, everyone on the above list. They disavowed Hitler and Mussolini only after their atrocities grew to indefensible levels.



The plot fell apart when Butler went public. The general revealed the details of the coup before the McCormack-Dickstein Committee, which would later become the notorious House Un-American Activities

Committee. (In the 50s, this committee would destroy the lives of hundreds of innocent Americans with its communist witch hunts.) The Committee heard the testimony of Butler and French, but failed to call in any

of the coup plotters for questioning, other than MacGuire. In fact, the Committee whitewashed the public version of its final report, deleting the names of powerful businessmen whose reputations they sought to protect. The most likely reason for this response is that Wall Street had undue influence in Congress also. Even more alarming, the elite-controlled media failed to pick up on the story, and even today the incident remains little known. The elite managed to spin the story as nothing more than the rumors and hearsay of Butler and French, even though Butler was a Quaker of unimpeachable honesty and integrity. Butler, appalled by the cover-up, went on national radio to denounce it, but with little success.

Butler was not vindicated until 1967, when journalist John Spivak uncovered the Committee's internal, secret report. It clearly confirmed Butler's story:

In the last few weeks of the committee's life it received evidence showing that certain persons had attempted to establish a fascist organization in this country...

There is no question that these attempts were discussed, were planned, and might have been placed in execution if the financial backers deemed it expedient...

MacGuire denied [Butler's] allegations under oath, but your committee was able to verify all the pertinent statements made to General Butler, with the exception of the direct statement suggesting the creation organization. This, however, corroborated in the correspondence of MacGuire with his principle, Robert Sterling Clark, of New York City, while MacGuire was abroad studying the various form of veterans' organizations of

Fascist character.

Needless to say, the survival of America's democracy is not an automatic or sure thing. Americans need to remain vigilant against all enemies... both foreign and domestic.

Sloshy Uncle Drew's Best Fruitcake Ever!

Ingredients

- 1 cup butter

- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1 tablespoon baking soda



Reasons To Enjoy Real Butter

Butter has gotten a bad reputation for many years, starting in the last century with the rise of margarine, which we now recognize as a deadly trans fat. More recently, butter has been shunned in favor of olive and other healthy oils. But here's why we should reserve a place at the table for good old-fashioned butter.

A study from Lund University in Sweden shows that butter leads to considerably less elevation of fats in the blood after a meal compared with olive and flaxseed oils. High blood fat normally raises cholesterol levels in the blood, which according to the discredited "lipid hypothesis", elevates the risk of atherosclerosis and heart attack.

Why doesn't butter raise blood lipid levels?

- 1. Butter is the most easily absorbable source of vitamin A, which supports the thyroid and adrenal glands, and in turn, the cardiovascular system.
- 2. Butter doesn't lead to excess body fat, since its short- and medium-chain fatty acids are burned for quick energy and not stores. Butter also gives a feeling of satiety that may decrease cravings and over-eating
- 3. Butter is rich in antioxidants such as vitamins A and E, as well as selenium, which protects against heart disease and cancer.

Sellwood Bridge FINAL Update


The Bridge is FINISHED!



Our Sellwood Bridge Update column began with these words... "It seems that every time our Client Shuttle starts across the Sellwood Bridge, a

nervous voice will come from the back, asking 'so... are they any closer to fixing this thing?'" We are pleased, proud, and relieved to say that after almost eight years of design and construction, we finally have a reassuring answer for that nervous client. They aren't just very, very close to fixing it, they're done! As of this month we can officially say

THE SELLWOOD BRIDGE IS FINISHED!

Yes, done! Completed. Accomplished. Concluded, finalized, wound up, and ENDED! Well, mostly. SellwoodBridge.org, the county's website for the project, points out that "...as construction work wraps up, the contractor is working on clean-up tasks throughout the project area. At times workers will be out on the bridge or around the roadway. Traffic cones and warning signs will be put up if work affects traffic." There were indeed a few construction cones on the Bridge when we checked today, but they were few and far between.

Here's some last minute milestones as we get used to having a Bridge we don't have to think about...

Speed, weight and vehicle length limits are changing: The speed limit on the bridge has increased to 30 mph and the speed limit on Hwy. 43 near the bridge returned to 35 mph. The 30-foot vehicle length limit on the bridge has been eliminated. Signs for the new vehicle weight limit on the bridge will be posted in December.

TriMet service returns: TriMet bus service has returned to the Sellwood Bridge after a 12-year absence. Line 99 provides weekday rush hour service across the bridge, connecting the east side with westside destinations from Lake Oswego to downtown Portland. Read the news on TriMet's <u>website</u>.

Changes for 6th/Tacoma Signal: The traffic signal phases for north and south-bound movements on SE 6th Ave. will be combined to improve east-west traffic flow on Tacoma St. The signal change should be made in the next month. Signs will be installed to prevent right turns on red for westbound traffic on Tacoma and northbound traffic on 6th.

The end of the Sellwood Bridge Construction also means an end to our Sellwood Bridge Update column, so this is the last time our crack Bridge Reporting staff with regale you with the details of the revival of our wobbly neighbor. Both fans of the Update can take comfort in the fact that we'll do a retrospective of the entire Bridge Project in next month's newsletter, and, if anything new on the Bridge DOES happen in the next few years, we'll be right here to tell you all about it.

At the end of an era like this, people search for ways to express the bittersweet turmoil we all must be feeling. The sad truth is that mere words can never express the depth of our emotions at closing the Bridge Update. Instead of relying on platitudes, we'll close this last column with the words that have brought a tear to our eye since the Sellwood Bridge Update began, and advice that will serve Bridge trackers well into their lonely future...

Review from "Dan" on Goodreads

Dionne's intellectual history of the development of U.S. contempory political ideologies. The book is divided, first half left, second half right. The strenghts and weaknesses or each and their evolution until the dawn of the Clintonian era is explored. The book is a little dated, first published in 1991 and only spottily updated, save for the aferword; however, the themes explored remain easily identified and quickly contextualized. If anything, the distance from the bulk of the events Dionne features serves them well as they have become less charged as individual incidents, therefore enhancing the reader's ability to consider them less viscerally than would have been the case were the book newer. "Why American's Hate Politics" would serve as an easy primer on how U.S. political thinking has become so stagnated and why we insist of re-fighting old battles in new guises. Dionne is a PhD, and scholar at the Brookings Institution, a columnist for The Washington Post, and a regular commentator on NPR's "All Things Considered." Highly and unreservedly recommended!



So what did we learn?

Since we can never know for sure what is or is not propaganda, we may have to settle for the idea that it might not matter. Propaganda can be used in service of "good" or "bad", the specific information in it may be accurate or not, the distortion of reality it creates may be useful or not... we may think of it as bad, but propaganda may be value-neutral in itself.

Truth is what differentiates propaganda from communication. If hearing the message leaves you with a less accurate, more distorted, and less useful view of the world then it was propaganda. If it leaves you with a more accurate and useful view, then it was communication. Most communication exists on a spectrum between these two extremes. In either case our obligation is the same... determine the truth through multiple sources then take intelligent action on the reality-based content. This may be one cast where being Furious can be helpful... once you've determined whether you were being propagandized, you'll know the appropriate reaction to the people who were dehumanizing *you*!

Know your enemy

The only way to defeat it is to know it's there, so we first have to define it. Let's start where everyone does today, with Wikipedia...

Propaganda is the deliberate, systematic attempt to shape perceptions, manipulate cognitions, and direct behavior to achieve a response that furthers the desired intent of the propagandist." More comprehensive is the description by Richard Alan Nelson: "Propaganda is neutrally defined as a systematic form of purposeful persuasion that attempts to influence the emotions, attitudes, opinions, and actions of specified target audiences for ideological, political or commercial purposes through the controlled transmission of one-sided messages (which may or may not be factual) via mass and direct media channels."

Wikipedia notes propaganda on the left, right, and middle, in religion, political, and corporate settings, in peacetime and wartime, in workplace adults and schoolyard children. It advances many theories of propaganda and particularly notes the difficulty of separating propaganda from real education. But one thing that was consistent across all theories was that while there was no definition of propaganda, there were ways to spot it...

Deceitful, manipulative, persuasive or informative? However you perceive it, propaganda has been used to change the way the world thinks and behaves for thousands of years.



...from The Institute for Propaganda Analysis

PROPAGANDA – the use of a variety of communication techniques that create an emotional appeal to accept a particular belief or opinion, to adopt a certain behavior or to perform a particular action. There is some disagreement about whether all persuasive communication is propagandistic or whether the propaganda label can only be applied to dishonest messages.

NAME CALLING – links a person, or idea, to a negative symbol. Examples: commie, fascist, yuppie

GLITTERING GENERALITIES – use of virtue words; the opposite of name calling, i.e., links a person, or idea, to a positive symbol. Examples: democracy, patriotism, family The next two are ways of making false connections:

TRANSFER – a device by which the propagandist links the authority or prestige of something well respected and revered, such as church or nation, to something he would have us accept. Example: apolitical activist closes her speech with a prayer

TESTIMONIAL – a public figure or a celebrity promotes or endorses a product, a policy, or a political candidate. Examples: an athlete appears on the Wheaties box; an actor speaks at a political rally

The following three constitute special appeals: **PLAIN FOLKS** – attempt to convince the audience that a prominent person and his ideas are "of the people." Examples: a prominent politician eats at McDonald's; an actress is photographed shopping for groceries

BANDWAGON – makes the appeal that "everyone else is doing it, and so should you." Examples: an ad states that "everyone is rushing down to their Ford dealer"

FEAR – plays on deep-seated fears; warns the audience that disaster will result if they do not follow a particular course of action. Example: an insurance company pamphlet includes pictures of houses destroyed floods, followed up by details about home-owners' insurance. The next two are types of logical fallacies:

BAD LOGIC – an illogical message is not necessarily propagandistic; it can be just a logical mistake; it is propaganda if logic is manipulated deliberately to promote a cause. Example: Senator X wants to regulate the power industry. All Communist governments regulate their power industries. Senator X is a

UNWARRANTED EXTRAPOLATION – making huge predictions about the future on the basis of a few small facts. Example: If the U.S. approves NAFTA, thousands of jobs and factories will move to Mexico.

- Misunderstanding the Process identifies ways in which misleading assumptions about the nature
 and extent of executive or legislative power drive problematic promises, attacks and selfcongratulatory communication. So, for example, the complexity of the legislative process
 makes it possible for bills and votes to be misconstrued.

The full quote is:

"The aide said that guys like me were "in what we call the **reality-based community," which he defined as people who "believe that solutions emerge from your judicious study of discernible reality." ... "That's not the way the world really works anymore," he continued. "We're an empire now, and when we act, we create our own reality. And while you're studying that reality—judiciously, as you will—we'll act again, creating other new realities, which you can study too, and that's how things will sort out. We're history's actors ... and you, all of you, will be left to just study what we do."**



Here's a good example of some prime propaganda targeted at Leftys. The Trans-Pacific Partnership may be dead, but there was a lot of mud slung back when it looked more viable. We wrote an article about the lies and distortion called "Winning Dirty on TPP- Corporatists are pulling out a familiar, ugly playbook". From our article...

"A PR firm called <u>270 Strategies</u>, headed by two Obama campaign veterans, has just created a website in support of TPP called the "Progressive Coalition for American Jobs". The website touts "More jobs, protections for workers, and free and fair trade" as benefits of the TPP. That wasn't enough to convince Dave Johnson at Campaign for America's Future, so he called up the "Progressive Coalition" to ask <u>a few clarifying questions</u>. He wanted to know: 1) Who is in the coalition? 2) Who is funding the campaign? and 3) Has anyone at 270 Strategies read the TPP agreement?

None of his repeated calls or messages resulted in a reply, but digging a little on his own he found a few answers. The Washington Post's Fact Checker had already given the Jobs claim "4 Pinocchios". No other members of the "coalition" were listed on the website or anywhere else. "Progressive" went down in flames when Dave found a letter from actual Progressives Raul Grijalva and Keith Ellison (leaders of the

Congressional Progressive Caucus) expressing their doubts both about the substance of the deal and the emphasis on Fast Track authority. His last question is answered by the news each day... no one but the negotiators and the roughly 500 CEOs who had input on the deal have read it. Interestingly, when we went to the site ourselves the "Get the Facts" link was a dead end when we clicked it."

Another prime example of Lefty propaganda... there's a lot of pushback (for obvious reasons) from the fossil fuel industry on renewable energy sources, but that's no excuse for lying about it. There have been many stories (some more true than others) of people being dissuaded from solar, wind, front yard gardens, rain capture, or other activities that eco-conscious Progressives would care about. However, digging deeper, one frequently finds that the story isn't as cut-and-dried as expected. Here's one example, along with its debunk...

Again, while everybody does it, not everybody does it the same way. We found several sources for debunking of all kinds from all directions, but there was a clear difference. While most of the Lefty sources were at least broadly concerned with factual information, most of the Righty "fact checkers" were little better than propaganda themselves. If <u>Snopes</u> or <u>PolitiFact</u> set the standard for centrist fact checkers, then

<u>Media Matters</u> would be a left-leaning but still nominally objective source. We could find no equivalent to Media Matters on the Right. We aren't saying there isn't one, but we couldn't find it and we would gladly examine any alternatives people would care to submit. Lest you think this is our own Lefty bias showing, it's not a new observation. Here's a chatroom conversation that describes the problem beautifully...

MRC highlights instances of liberal bias in the media, whereas Media Matters highlights instances of conservative misinformation in the media.

What I'm looking for is an organization that posts stuff like: "Nancy Pelosi said Statement X today. This is false because X contradicts Statement Y, and we know Y to be true."

Whereas, MRC seems to take the slightly different approach of: "MSNBC reported that Nancy Pelosi said Statement X today, but completely ignored Newt Gingrich saying just-asimportant Statement Y today. This illustrates MSNBC's bias in favor of Pelosi."

Is there a difference between "point of view" and "propaganda"?

This is another yes/no answer. If you have many information sources and can compare between them, you at least have the possibility of being an informed information consumer. If you only have one point of view available, then there's no difference at all. Once you're thinking critically for yourself, it's vital to have a range of opinions and subjects to check each other against. Media consolidation has crippled our access locally and nationally to alternative views from Corporate media owners; an issue that hit us very specifically in Portland with the loss of KPOJ. Even though it's harder, seeking out alternative viewpoints is still possible. Supporting progressive community outlets like KBOO and XRAY are ways we can stem the tide.




News To Make You Furious- Global Warming Lies in Murdoch's Wall Street Journal

Since this is a website available around the world, it is appropriate to talk about how to combat propaganda that has the full weight and power of the state behind it -- because there are still places on this earth where that's happening.

The more common public relations challenge is combating propaganda on a smaller scale, whether it's a political campaign, a corporate battle or a non-profit trying to generate awareness of an issue in the face of a government covering up the evidence.

It's hard to fight fire with fire, especially when you (a) can't use the same evil techniques, manipulations and lies as the other side and (b) are typically David in a fight against Goliath since propaganda is a tool of those in power and on top.
