





Tom's Tidbits

Death by Denial



Greetings,

"I could stand in the middle of 5th Avenue and shoot somebody and I wouldn't lose voters."

Trump's chilling remark hasn't been tested literally (as of today), but the reasoning behind it has. 5th Avenue is in a city that has seen 24,167 of the state's 33,648 covid deaths. So far. Not all of these deaths can be placed at Trump's feet but many can, and they join over 250,000 corpses piled on a metaphorical 5th Avenue that slinks from New York to Hawaii. And Trump was right, because he didn't lose any voters except the ones he actually killed. In fact he gained almost over 100,000 from his 2016 NY total.

July- US passes 150,000 dead.

August- "It is what it is." Trump activates Defense Production Act to supply PPE and ventilators; does not use it.

September- US passes 200,000 dead. "We have done an incredible job, and we're doing an incredible job"

October- After Trump and more than a dozen staff test positive for Covid, he returns to live, mostly maskless, tightly-packed rallies. White House begins referring to the pandemic in the past tense. November- US passes 250,000 dead. Trump complains Pfizer and FDA withheld vaccine until after election.

No, he hasn't shot anyone, but Donald Trump's denial of reality has killed thousands of our fellow Americans just as surely as if he shot them himself. His desecrations will end in just under 2 months, but he WILL kill thousands more before he's out. We must... MUST hold him accountable. Not with torches and pitchforks, no matter how justified that might be, but with proper, cool-headed, impartial investigations. And trials and jail if warranted. History will make its judgement regardless of what we do, but it can't be the only judgement made. Donald Trump needs to be told explicitly, by the country he's abused, that he was wrong.

He took responsibility for it when he placed his tiny little hand on a Bible he never read, grunted an oath he didn't comprehend, and entered an office he could never fill. There are situations that demand action, despite any political costs, where inaction is incompetence at best and treason at worst. We're paying that price right now... he must as well.

What's wrong with my car?

Diagnosing vehicle problems requires more than a code reader or gut feeling

The Car Talk guys did the automotive world a bit of a disservice. They led people to believe complex automotive problems can be accurately diagnosed in 4 minutes from a vague description and some mimicked noises. Throw in a couple wisecracks and the vehicle is all but repaired! While this sometimes works on a radio show, the real world is much different. The cause of some automotive problems is indeed obvious and the diagnosis straightforward, but other problems are complex, may only appear

intermittently or under certain conditions, or may be caused by multiple interacting systems. It's correspondingly harder to track these issues down. When we start looking for the cause of your vehicle's glitches we start with the least invasive, least expensive methods first and move on to the more invasive and time-consuming techniques only when necessary (and always, only with your approval). Here's a look at some of our inspection and diagnostic methods so you'll be prepared when it's time to follow this path with your own vehicle...

Before there's a problem... inspect and monitor

Before ever starting down the diagnostic path, it makes sense to monitor your vehicle and prevent as many failures as possible. Whenever possible, we assign your vehicle to the same ASE-Certified Technician so we have someone familiar with the vehicle's history, performance, and quirks. Many of our clients don't know we perform a 40-point inspection and double-check of our work after every vehicle service. Combined with the Technician's notes and evaluations this gives us an on-going overview your vehicle's condition, so if it begins to develop problems we may have a clue to where they're starting.

If your vehicle hasn't been in for service lately, isn't having a specific problem, and you just want to have it generally checked out, we offer a FREE Basic 90-point Inspection. (This is would be considered an "in-depth or "multipoint" inspection by many other shops). Our ASE-Certified Technicians check all the major systems of your vehicle that are accessible without taking things apart or using technical tools. It's a good way to catch issues like active leaks or worn or broken parts before they fail, but it's far from an exhaustive inspection or a diagnosis of any but the grossest problems.

Our Comprehensive Inspection (also called our "130-point Inspection", "Inspection-For-Repair", or "IFR") is our more thorough inspection. It's a look at major systems on your vehicle, covering details like fluid pH, ignition components, filters, fluids, brake pad thickness, and much more. Your vehicle will be assigned to an ASE-Certified Technician who will evaluate the following areas...

Fluids- 18 points

Brakes/Axle- 14 points

Chassis Inspection- 12 points

Under-hood Inspection- 33 points

Battery/Starting/Charging- 12 points

Miscellaneous- 7 points

When we're done, we compile a comprehensive list and prioritize all repair and maintenance recommendations so you'll have a precise mechanical picture of your vehicle and can make informed choices based on your ACTUAL VEHICLE NEEDS. We recommend this inspection to all our New Clients to establish a baseline for their vehicle, but we also recommend it be repeated yearly to catch developing problems before they become serious and expensive.

When something goes wrong... diagnose, prescribe, and repair

The diagnostic process begins when a client has a specific issue that's troubling them. Again, obvious problems aren't very difficult to diagnose or prescribe repairs for... if sparks are coming from your alternator then it's a pretty good bet that replacing it will help. But that may not be the end of the story. What made the alternator go bad? Was it faulty itself, or did some other system cause it to fail? Will the new alternator be compromised by a fault in another system? Even obvious problems can have non-obvious aspects, and a good diagnosis will address all these points.

One situation likely to require real diagnostic expertise is when the vehicle develops a problem but is still drivable. An unusual sound, a new grinding, a sudden loss of performance, all could be serious problems without obvious solutions. The more information you can give us the easier it can be to find the source of your problem, but it may still require some time to specifically identify. This is where our Technician's years of experience and our state-of-the-art diagnostic equipment come into play. We track down the exact cause of your problem so we can propose an exact solution. We never "throw parts" at a problem; making repairs without a specific diagnosis in the hope that we fix it. That's expensive for you and inefficient for us. Our process is always diagnose, prescribe, repair.

Another common diagnostic scenario is the dreaded "check engine light". This innocuous little light can result in anything from a loose gas cap to a serious malfunction. You probably know that we can "pull the codes" for the light, but there is a world of difference between knowing the fault code and knowing the cause of or solution to the problem. Your vehicle's computer can store fault codes, and most codes can be caused by a single or combinations of failures. The fault codes will give our Technicians clues, but we'll still need to establish the actual cause of the problem. We'll pull fault codes for free if requested, but we can't move from this information to professional guaranteed repair without diagnosis and repair verification.

The hardest diagnostic tasks come from problems where there are no fault codes, or where the symptoms may be mild or intermittent. These complaints can challenge even the best tools and technicians! Difficult problems on late model computer-controlled vehicles often require more time for diagnostic procedures than the actual repair time needed to correct them. For example, we might invest hours testing vehicle systems to ultimately find that corrosion in some buried wiring connector is creating a malfunction, in order to spend just a few minutes cleaning the guilty


connector to resolve the problem. Tracking down these problems can be time-consuming and difficult, but accurate diagnosis of your vehicle's troubles is imperative to provide precise estimates and economical, targeted, lasting repairs.

Why do you charge for diagnostic time?

We spend roughly 20% of our total available time on some form of diagnostic evaluation, and the expense of proprietary equipment and experienced personnel represents major overhead. Aside from the labor costs of experienced ASE Certified Technicians, diagnostic equipment and data access are costly. There is a world of difference between a code reader and a manufacturer-specific diagnostic scanner that can access and record multiple live data streams! Even a good generic diagnostic scanner is expensive, but the manufacturer-specific diagnostic tools we require are \$3000 to \$9000 each and require thousands of dollars in yearly updates. The software and databases we must subscribe to for each make of vehicle we service are correspondingly expensive.

Like many shops, we could choose not to do technical work. We could just take profit from basic repairs and maintenance services, and then when presented a real problem say "Oh sorry we can't do that" and send clients to seek help elsewhere. Or, worse yet, we could hire unqualified techs to stumble around and guess at causes, and then replace parts to find out if they're right- all at our client's expense. We could just to do the high-profit easy stuff, but that's not why people use our service.

The time has passed when someone with basic knowledge and a few tools can properly diagnose or repair your vehicle. Today's technical problems require the attention of highly trained and experienced personnel, along with the use of proprietary equipment and data resources. Maintaining this ability to accurately diagnose technical problems is expensive. We understand it is frustrating to hear that we need to charge for time just to determine the cause and correction for your vehicle's problem before we can even give an accurate estimate for repair. But, not billing for diagnostic time would quickly force us to change our professional methods. We prefer to stay well-equipped, well-staffed, and ready to solve your most difficult automotive problems. Honest and accurate billing for our most valuable product- our expertise- is the only way to keep providing the service you've come to expect..

Automobiles are just like any other product; occasional flaws in manufacture or design can cause problems once they leave the factory. When an issue is identified the manufacturers and government work hard to bring the vehicles back in for refit or repair, but not all recalls make the front pages. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration maintains a <u>constantly updated list of recalls from every manufacturer</u>. Kyle's Kitchen

Cranberry Apple Stuffed Pork Loin

Drew's retirement has meant the Kitchen has been quiet for the last month... no clashing pans, no sizzling sauces, no laughing or talking over good food. We can't



have that, though, and even in CovidWorld our virtual Kitchen has room for a new chef... meet Kyle Speers, another of our Service Advisors with a knack for cooking. He'll be taking over the Golden Ladle of the Kitchen and bringing you his own take on cuisine from the fundamental to the fabulous. And he's taking over at a critical time... during a Covid Thanksgiving, where the seasonal feast is threatened, we're all looking for something special. Kyle's first recipe rises to the challenge with a unique recipe that serves both the smaller groups we'll be seeing this year and the larger feasts we hope to see next year...

Cranberry Apple Stuffed Pork Loin

Ingredients:

- 1 boneless pork loin (about 3-4 lbs)
- Sea salt and freshly ground pepper
- ½ cup panko or homemade breadcrumbs
- ½ cup chicken stock
- 1 cup peeled, chopped tart green apples
- 1/3 cup dried cranberries
- 1/3 cup chopped walnuts, toasted
- ¼ cup minced shallots
- 2 Tbsp pure maple syrup
- 1 tsp minced rosemary

Preparation:

- 1. Preheat oven to 450°F.
- 2. How to butterfly the pork loin: Place the pork loin roast fat side down on a cutting board. Note that one long side of the pork loin roast will be thicker, and one side thinner. Using a sharp knife, make a long cut an inch or so from the edge from the thinner long side of the roast at about a 45° angle, stopping a half inch from reaching the bottom of the roast. Then angle the knife so that it is flat, parallel to the cutting board, and make slow, shallow cuts into the roast, along the same line. As you cut, you can open up the top part of the roast like a book. Keep making slow, even cuts until you have "rolled" the roast out completely.
- 3. Pound the butterflied roast to an even thickness. With the pork roast unfolded, cover with 2 layers of plastic wrap. Pound with a meat mallet to flatten to a somewhat even thickness. Remove plastic wrap. Sprinkle the pork with the salt and pepper and set aside.
- 4. Make the filling. Place the panko and stock in a small bowl and stir to combine. Stir in the apples, walnuts, cranberries, shallots, maple syrup and rosemary.
- 5. Roll up pork roast with filling. Spread the filling over surface of the pork, leaving an inch margin around all sides except for the fat layer side- with that side leave a 2" margin. Starting with the end of the roast rectangle that does not have the fat layer on the bottom, roll up the roast.
- 6. Secure with kitchen string. Tie the roast in 1-2" intervals with cotton kitchen string. (at this point you can wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate if you are making ahead).
- 7. Bake. Coat the bottom of a roasting pan with cooking spray or a little olive oil. Place the roast in the pan and cook at 450° for 15 min to brown the top, then reduce the oven temperature to 325°F. Cook uncovered, for about 30-40 min, or until the pork reaches an internal temperature of 140°F.
- 8. Rest and serve. Tent the roast with foil and let it rest for 10 min. Remove the kitchen string and slice into ½" thick slices to serve.
- 9. Save the pan drippings! Serve with pan drippings or use the pan drippings to make gravy.



Origins Of Totalitarianism







<u>Unusual molecule found in atmosphere on Saturn's moon Titan</u>, Ashley Stricland, CNN, Oct 2020

Saturn's largest moon, Titan, is the only moon in our solar system that has a thick atmosphere. It's four times denser than Earth's. And now, scientists have discovered a molecule in it that has never been found in any other atmosphere. The particle is called cyclopropenylidene, or C3H2, and it's made of carbon and hydrogen. This simple carbon-based molecule could be a precursor that contributes to chemical reactions that may create complex compounds. And those compounds could be the basis for potential life on Titan.

<u>10 Steps That Can Restore Scientific Integrity in Government</u>, Lauren Kurtz and Gretchen Goldman in Scientific American, Nov 2020

From the beginning, the inky Aguas Zarcas resembled a legendary carbonaceous chondrite that exploded in 1969 over Murchison, an Australian cattle town. Geology students helped collect about 100 kilograms of Murchison, and a local postmaster mailed pieces of it to labs across the world. To date, scientists have recognized nearly 100 different amino acids in it, many used by organisms on Earth and many others rare or nonexistent in known life. Hundreds more amino acids have been inferred but not yet identified...

<u>Archaeologists Found 115,000-Year-Old Human Footprints Where They Shouldn't Be</u>, Caroline Delbert in Popular Mechanics, Sep 2020

That means their special, tiny batch of preserved footprints were made in unique conditions that also form a kind of "fingerprint" for pinning them all to the same timeframe. From there, scientists started to look at who made the footprints. Homo sapiens weren't the only upright humanoid primate in the game, but the evidence, the scientists say, suggests we were the ones traipsing through the drying lakebed...

<u>Chinese Asteroid Mining Robot Due to Launch in November</u>, Evan Gough in Universe Today, Sep 2020

A Chinese company says that they'll be launching an asteroid-mining robot by November. Origin Space is a private company based in Beijing. Though they're calling this an "asteroid mining robot," it's really a pre-cursor mission to actual mining. In reality, NEO-1 as it's called, will be testing technologies aimed at the eventual mining of asteroids...

Rising Temperatures Are Pushing Antarctica Past Point of No Return, Scientists Warn, Marlowe Hood in ScienceAlert, Sep 2020

These devastating increases in the global waterline – enough to cripple coastal cities from Mumbai to Miami and displace hundreds of millions of people – would unfold over hundreds to thousands of years. But the man-made greenhouse gas emissions that could guarantee such an outcome are on track to occur on a timescale measured in decades, they reported in the journal Nature.


<u>Do We Live in a Simulation? Chances Are about 50–50</u>, Anil Ananthaswarmy in Scientific American, Oct 2020

Ever since Nick Bostrom of the University of Oxford wrote a seminal paper about the simulation argument in 2003, philosophers, physicists, technologists and, yes, comedians have been grappling with the idea of our reality being a simulacrum. Some have tried to identify ways in which we can discern if we are simulated beings. Others have attempted to calculate the chance of us being virtual entities. Now a new analysis shows that the odds that we are living in base reality—meaning an existence that is not simulated—are pretty much even. But the study also demonstrates that if humans were to ever develop the ability to simulate conscious beings, the chances would overwhelmingly tilt in favor of us, too, being virtual denizens inside someone else's computer...

before FERC for approval, the parties are hopeful dam removal could take place in 2023."
