As we celebrate independence, what still unites us?



Greetings,

The desire to be left alone can be a value that binds people together. That's a little ironic, but it's worked in America (very imperfectly) for 245 years. Today it seems freedom and independence from government have devolved into freedom and independence from each other, and it can be hard to feel the bonds of common citizenship. Each year the divisions seem to grow. While independence is *one* value to respect, I'd like to offer a couple other values that could unify us as Americans. They shouldn't be controversial... they're things we *say* we already believe.

Virtually all Americans at least profess respect for our Declaration of Independence, but even the few who don't know one of its most famous ideas: Governments "derive their just powers from the consent of the people" and are "instituted among men" to secure "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness" for the citizens. That, in writing, is what the American government was built to do. This fundamental assumption should unite EVERY American.

Of course it doesn't. Too tragically many people have diminished "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness" to a poetic slogan. They see it as an unrealistic and naïve aspiration for any government; certainly not an achievable one for our own. But it unified us as a country 245 years ago despite our desire for individual independence, and it may be what's missing today.

What does "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness" need to mean to be more than flowery gibberish? Can it mean anything at all in today's real world? Actually, it can settle some of the most divisive issues we face.


"Life" means more than simple existence, it means a Life of health and dignity. It means Single Payer; access to Health Care when you're sick without the added worry of bankruptcy. It means clean air (a right denied to 40% of Americans), clean water (a distant memory in Flint, Michigan), and safe food (increasingly a luxury). It means shelter, a right not secured for over 500,000 of our fellow Americans every night and endangered for millions more.

"Liberty" applies to our Justice system, from police to courts to prisons. The idea that "Liberty" only comes with 'equal justice under law' is one of the most basic elements of a free society... there is no Liberty without Justice. Yet actual people now yield liberty to 'corporate people'. Racial bias is rampant in criminal courts and economic bias rules in civil ones. Civil Asset Forfeiture almost demands abuse by the police who use it. For-profit prisons incentivize police to find cell occupants instead of criminals. None of us have Liberty if fellow citizens fear their 'protectors', so the increasing militarization of police and the bloodbath of police shootings threatens us all.

No one is guaranteed happiness, but the "Pursuit of Happiness" is different. Among other things it means education, but in today's world education is mocked and ridiculed. It's derided as 'indoctrination' by people who don't, or consciously refuse to, understand its importance. For those who still appreciate it, education is fast becoming a luxury instead of a right. Funding schools with property taxes has resulted in a spiral of bad schools for poor neighborhoods and good schools for rich ones. The exploding cost of higher education has turned it into a set of economic shackles that prevents home ownership, starting a family, business investment, or any of the options the education was supposed to improve.

In this time of division and strife, precious few things remain to unite us. If Americans are divided, if Americans are fighting, if Americans can't see the common humanity in each other, then it may be time to go back to our founding principles to find what Americans are supposed to be. In today's world it may not heal the wounds, but it might give a hint where healing lies.



Covid is Fading Away

Our Covid policies are changing to adapt

Covid has been a long, ugly, sad road so far, but it may finally be ending. The graphs are trending the right way, people are eager to get back to their lives, the economy is ready to re-start, and summer's here... it looks like the US is coming out of our Covid lockdown! Some people are past ready to ditch their masks (for good reasons and bad) but others are still a little hesitant about loosening up in a world that still has an unpredictable pathogen in it. Businesses have to decide how to safely reopen and how to accommodate peoples' concerns across the spectrum.

As an 'essential business' open since the start of the pandemic, we had to make deep changes in our business to make it safer and easier for you to deal with us. We're eager to see some of them go away but we found others were actually improvements. Here's an update on what we're changing back... and what we're keeping.

Masks Are No Longer Required In Our Office

Effective June 30, masking and social distancing requirements are ended for Oregon businesses.

Effective immediately, you won't be required to wear a mask in our office. If you'd still prefer to have one we have free masks waiting.

We're Ending 'Will Wait' Appointments And Closing Our Waiting Room

When Covid closed our Waiting Room we had to pause 'will wait' appointments as well. This was awkward for a while, but we found it actually improved the service we were able to provide and it's one of the Covid changes we plan to keep. Going forward, we will no longer offer 'will wait' appointments (except minor services like bulb changes or DEQ tests).

We're Bringing Back Our Courtesy Shuttle

Our Courtesy Shuttle will be returning to the road soon, but not quite yet... we'll keep you posted when there's an exact date. If you haven't yet taken advantage of our Courtesy Shuttle then here's what you need to know...

- the Shuttle runs BY ADVANCE APPOINTMENT, so remember to request it when you schedule your appointment.
- The morning Shuttle makes three scheduled outbound runs at 8:30am, and 9:30am.
- The Shuttle DOES NOT run between 12:00pm and 1:00pm or at all on Saturdays.
- The evening Shuttle makes inbound runs until its final trip at 5pm.

We'll Keep Opening At 8AM

We changed from 7a-6p to 8a-6p at the start of the crisis, and it's worked out pretty well. We'll keep that in place for the foreseeable future, so our new PERMANENT hours are 8a-6p M-F, and 10a-1p on Saturday for Pickup and Dropoff.

The Lobby Will Change A Little Bit

Our attempts at Lobby crowd control included pylons and guide tape, but they only seemed confusing. They'll disappear soon, but please maintain social distance in our lobby for the next several months.

On the other hand, the clear shields at the front desk will probably help cut down on cold and flu post-Covid, free hand sanitizer at the front counter seemed like a good idea, and the HEPA air filter worked out well too. We'll be keeping these for your health and ours.

We'll Still Do Post-Service Sanitization

We'll continue our Post-Service Sanitization procedures for a while to come. That means aside from checking fluids, pressures, wipers, and a double-check of the work we did, we'll use sanitizer on all the interior surfaces touched during your service.

If You're Still Covid-Skittish...

If there's any reason you aren't quite ready to jump back into normality like nothing ever happened, we don't want to force you. You can still get Non-Contact service at our shop or even Pickup and Dropoff Service at your home or office. If you have ANY CONCERNS AT ALL, just ask your Service Advisor and we'll do everything we can to make you feel as comfortable and safe as possible in working with us.

That's what we know for now, but if there's anything to be learned from the Covid Crisis it's that things can change instantly. For Covid and for anything else, our policies are driven by concern for our clients and the quality and safety of your experience with us. 












The Eviction and Foreclosure Meltdown Isn't Bad for Everyone

Your neighbors may be worried, but the hedge funds aren't.

The Biden administration announced on June 24 an extension of the federal eviction moratorium issued by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) through July 31, 2021, and that it will implement a whole-of-government approach to prevent an historic wave of evictions this summer. The moratorium was set to expire on June 30.

These actions from the White House extend an essential lifeline to millions of renters who remain behind on rent and would be at heightened risk of eviction when the moratorium expires. Extending the moratorium through July gives state and local governments more time to distribute more than \$46 billion in emergency rental assistance (ERA) to those most in need. The administration's whole-of-government effort to stem evictions and help ensure ERA is provided efficiently, effectively, and equitably can keep families safely housed and bolster the administration's efforts to contain COVID-19. While in many areas in the U.S. vaccinations rates are up and COVID-19 caseloads are down, communities with

lower vaccination rates and more COVID-19 cases tend to be the same communities that have large numbers of renters at heightened risk of eviction.

I'm a tenant who hasn't been able to pay full rent since the pandemic started. How much will I owe when the moratorium ends on June 30?

I keep hearing about a tidal wave of evictions looming when the moratorium ends. Is that what's coming on July 1?

How much rental assistance has been dispensed to people so far?

Even if they qualify for that assistance, there's no guarantee renters will get the money in time. The state's backlog on doling out rent assistance is that bad.

But it's not all bad news. Individuals and families are facing homelessness and small landlords are facing bankruptcy, but rest easy! Our Corporate Brothers and Sisters will apparently do just fine...

<u>Bank of America and Chase could restart mortgage foreclosures as early as July, but Wells Fargo is</u> waiting until 2022, Megan Leonhardt on CNBC.com, May 2021

"About 2.1 million homeowners are still in forbearance plans that suspend their mortgage payments, according to Mortgage Bankers Association's latest data. And about 1.8 million families are not in forbearance, but are already at least 90 days delinquent on paying their mortgages as of April, according to the latest data from Black Knight, which monitors mortgage data. For now, many are protected from eviction through a foreclosure moratorium on federally backed loans.

But those protections are running short on time. President Joe Biden extended the federal foreclosure moratorium earlier this year, but that will expire on June 30, 2021. Many of the forbearance programs on federally backed loans are set to lapse this fall. In a hearing Wednesday, Senators asked the CEOs of several major banks about what they plan to do to help Americans caught in this situation. Here's what the heads of Bank of America, Chase and Wells Fargo said..."

<u>If You Sell a House These Days, the Buyer Might Be a Pension Fund</u>, Ryan Dezember in the Wall Street Journal, Apr 2021

D.R. Horton Inc. built 124 houses in Conroe, Texas, rented them out and then put the whole community, Amber Pines at Fosters Ridge, on the block. A Who's Who of investors and home-rental firms flocked to the December sale. The winning \$32 million bid came from an online property-investing platform, Fundrise LLC, which manages more than \$1 billion on behalf of about 150,000 individuals. The country's most prolific home builder booked roughly twice what it typically makes selling houses to the middle class—an encouraging debut in the business of selling entire neighborhoods to investors.

What Happens When Hedge Funds Buy Up Neighborhoods, Joy Pullmann in TheFederalist, Jun 2021

"You now have permanent capital competing with a young couple trying to buy a house," real estate consultant John Burns told the Wall Street Journal. "That's going to make U.S. housing permanently more expensive." His firm estimates "that in many of the nation's top markets, roughly one in every five houses sold is bought by someone who never moves in."


"Between 2011 and 2017, some of the world's largest private-equity groups and hedge funds, as well as other large investors, spent a combined \$36 billion on more than 200,000 homes in ailing markets across the country. In one Atlanta zip code, they bought almost 90 percent of the 7,500 homes sold between January 2011 and June 2012; today, institutional investors own at least one in five single-family rentals in some parts of the metro area, according to Dan Immergluck, a professor at the Urban Studies Institute at Georgia State University. Some of the nation's hardest-hit housing markets were finally stabilized."

"Yet, even as these neighborhood stabilization strategies begin to take hold, communities face an additional threat to recuperation: unscrupulous absentee investors. Nationwide, would-be homebuyers and community developers are facing stiff competition from private investors who have seen a business opportunity in the foreclosure crisis and are rapidly buying up foreclosed properties to sell or rent out for a profit. Unlike homebuyers and municipalities, investors can buy properties in cash and in bulk-sometimes 'sight unseen'-purchasing them before homebuyers, nonprofits, or cities even have a chance to bid. In some communities, efforts to improve the neighborhood are being thwarted by investors who are either mothballing their properties or buying severely distressed homes and renting them out to vulnerable tenants with little to no rehabilitation or maintenance of the property."





Comment of the Month



This month's Comment comes from client Jen R., whose heat-related concern might be on other minds as well...

Will this heat melt my tires?

There's a short answer to this one... NO! Our Service Advisors guickly and unanimously said there was nothing to worry about, because tires don't melt... they soften. The vulcanizing process for rubber essentially makes one tire-sized molecule that can only decompose into its

component parts. As the tires get hot (not even from atmospheric heat; your tires get hot just driving down the road) the surface softens a little and tiny bits can be pulled off. This is the typical way your tire wears down over time anyway; it just happens a little faster when it's hot. Heat is not the way to destroy tires, in fact, when tires are recycled they have to be shredded, frozen, and shattered into tiny bits. Finally, you may rest somewhat easier knowing that your tires can take the heat better than the roads they're driving on. This article from Australia describes what happened when the heat got excessive... the tires were fine, but the road melted and stuck to the tires. You'll be sweating in this heat, but there's no reason to sweat over your tires!

Automobiles are just like any other product; occasional flaws in manufacture or design can cause problems once they leave the factory. When an issue is identified the manufacturers and government work hard to bring the vehicles back in for refit or repair, but not all recalls make the front pages. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration maintains a <u>constantly updated list of recalls from every manufacturer</u>. Kyle's Kitchen

Slow-Cooker Pork Carnitas



A taco is only as good as its stuffing. Here's a recipe that only takes 15 minutes to prep, then you hand it off to the slow cooker to make your tacos perfect.

Ingredients:

1 white onion, halved and thinly sliced 1 tbsp cumin

5 garlic cloves, minced 2 tbsp chopped fresh oregano

1 jalapeño, minced 2 oranges

3 lbs cubed pork shoulder 1 lime

Salt and freshly ground black pepper ⅓ cup chicken broth

Directions:

- 1. Place the onion, garlic, jalapeño and pork in the base of a slow cooker. Add the salt, pepper, cumin and oregano.
- 2. Zest the oranges and lime over the pork, then halve them and squeeze the juice over the pork. Pour the broth over the pork as well.
- 3. Put the lid on the slow cooker and set the heat on low. Cook for 7 hours, or until the meat is tender and easy to shred with a fork.
- 4. Use two forks to shred the meat. The pork can be served immediately (we prefer it in tacos) or stored in an airtight container in the refrigerator for up to five days, or in the freezer for up to a month.



Global warming may have already passed irreversible tipping point Al Jazeera, Jun 2021

From the article- Global warning may have already passed an irreversible tipping point, the scientist who led the biggest-ever expedition to the Arctic has warned. Presenting the first findings of the world's largest mission to the North Pole, an expedition involving 300 scientists from 20 countries, Markus Rex said on Tuesday that the researchers had found that Arctic ice is retreating faster than ever before. "The disappearance of summer sea ice in the Arctic is one of the first landmines in this minefield, one of the tipping points that we set off first when we push warming too far," he said during the presentation in Germany's capital, Berlin. "And one can essentially ask if we haven't already stepped on this mine and already set off the beginning of the explosion."

We Tried to Publish a Replication of a Science Paper in Science. The Journal Refused.

From the article- Our story starts in 2008, when a group of researchers published an article (here it is without a paywall) that found political conservatives have stronger physiological reactions to threatening images than liberals do. The article was published in Science, which is one of the most

prestigious general science journals around. It's the kind of journal that can make a career in academia.

It was a path-breaking and provocative study. For decades, political scientists and psychologists have tried to understand the psychological roots of ideological differences. The piece published in Science offered some clues as to why liberals and conservatives differ in their worldviews. Perhaps it has to do with how the brain is wired, the researchers suggested—specifically, perhaps it's because conservatives' brains are more attuned to threats than liberals'. It was an exciting finding, it helped usher in a new wave of psychophysiological work in the study of politics, and it generated extensive coverage in popular media. In 2018, 10 years after the publication of the study, the findings were featured on an episode of NPR's Hidden Brain podcast...

Does the Trolley Problem Have a Problem?

<u>From the article</u>- Picture the following situation: You are taking a freshman-level philosophy class in college, and your professor has just asked you to imagine a runaway trolley barreling down a track toward a group of five people. The only way to save them from being killed, the professor says, is to hit a switch that will turn the trolley onto an alternate set of tracks where it will kill one person instead of five. Now you must decide: Would the mulling over of this dilemma enlighten you in any way?

I ask because the trolley-problem thought experiment described above—and its standard culminating question, Would it be morally permissible for you to hit the switch?—has in recent years become a mainstay of research in a subfield of psychology. Scientists use versions of the kill-one-to-save-five hypothetical, reworded and reframed for added nuance, as a standard way to probe the workings of the moral mind. The corpus of "trolleyology" data they've produced hints that men are more likely than women to sacrifice a life for the sake of several others, for example, and that younger people are inclined to do the same...











Learn to drive a Model T


A Portland Ferry? In 2022?

Blocks of ice and dirt lay hundreds of feet away, flung from the deep scar on the surface. This is the latest in a series of such curious craters discovered in the Siberian Arctic, after the first was identified in 2014.
